The Methodist Church has produced some training on EDI/ JDS (Equality Diversity and Inclusion/ Justice Dignity and Solidarity).

Our churches are committed to Inclusion and to ensuring that every aspect of our work reflects God's welcome to all. I hope that we will welcome this new training. Some of it will be new to us, other aspects will no doubt be familiar, but even there it will be helpful to be reminded of things we knew or to learn about evolving understandings.

People in Leadership roles such as Ministers, Local Preachers and Stewards will be expected to undertake this training. For other roles such as Worship Leaders, the training isn't yet mandatory, but we hope people will want to do it. I'd encourage as many people as possible, and particularly all Church Council Members, to take this opportunity to learn to be more Christ-like as we serve others.

Training will be available online and face-to-face. Initially we will offer a number of sessions at various times and venues to ensure the maximum opportunities to take this up. This will be offered as a full day of training on a Saturday or as a set of three evenings.

After the initial roll out, we will work with neighbouring circuits to ensure that people continue to have opportunities to access regular opportunities for this.

Greetings from the Manse

It is a time of change.

This magazine is moving to quarterly publication rather than being produced every other month. I suspect that our editor will be relieved because the deadline does normally come round very quickly.

However, I am thinking more about changes to the nature of ministry and changes to our way of being church.

By the time that the next edition comes out we will have moved to the new arrangements for who is minister at which church. Great Glen and Houghton will have welcomed Revd Helen and the Wigston churches will have welcomed Revd Frances.

I hope that Affinity will continue to have articles from Great Glen and Houghton and that it will continue to be distributed in each of those churches, even though I will only be the minister for Oadby.

We will have to get used to new ways of working together. It was lovely to see so many friends attending the Chapel Tea and Anniversary Service at Houghton. Similarly, the Great Glen Souper Saturday fundraiser for Christian Aid was also well supported. It is important for all of us, that these links continue and are strengthened.

I hope by September that there will also have been great change in Glen. I have no doubt that Helen will want to encourage and build on the tremendous community engagement which happens at Saturday coffee and the way in which that draws people to us. I hope that by then we will have a new Youth Worker continuing and growing FNY. (Friday Night Youth)

Meanwhile, OTMC will itself be looking at change. So far, the Vision work that we have done has highlighted our strengths and weaknesses and given us a real enthusiasm for what we value about our Mission here. It has not yet given us a clear direction of the changes we need to make.

We hold fast to our call as "A Church for All at the Heart of the Community" but we need to express that in new ways.

As Joy Dine's hymn expresses it, we ask God to "End our longing for the old days, grant the vision that we lack... let us travel light, discarding excess baggage from the past." "When we set up camp and settle ... you disturb complacent comfort, pull the tent-pegs up again."

Elsewhere in the circuit, similar conversations are underway. Our friends at Wigston Magna and South Wigston will be under the same ministry team and will seek to work more closely together; the circuit will be exploring Vision priorities; Bishop Street will be reflecting on their recent review as a church in the City Centre Network of churches. All of us will continue to explore issues of Justice, Dignity and Solidarity as we undertake the new training, and two of our churches have weddings booked.

May you feel the love of God surrounding you, and the comfort of the Spirit supporting you, as we seek to follow our Saviour, Jesus, wherever he may lead.

Holiday reading: David Baddiel. 'Jews Don't Count' and Giles Fraser 'Chosen'.

I had been meaning to read David Baddiel's book for some time: I had seen much of the coverage describing the material in it.

Baddiel highlights the way in which conversations about discrimination fail to reflect the experience of Jews in Britain.

I highly recommend this book to help us examine our prejudices. It is certainly a wake-up call: even for those of us who try to be alert to the dangers of antisemitism, it is healthy to examine the quiet ways in which our biases remain.

For example, I was quite struck by his comments about BAME representation. He notes that there have been many instances where we celebrate the first person appointed to a particular job who is from a BAME background. Often, we will overlook the fact that a Jewish person has previously undertaken the same job: we simply forget to include Jews as minority ethnic.

Some people's prejudices continue to regard Jews as being financially successful, and simultaneously a drain on national resources: powerful and weak at the same time. Sometimes that contradiction can be implicit even within the same article or speech.

Whilst I was reading the book there were two stories in the British press where antisemitism was at the core of the arguments raging: a politician's quote and a newspaper cartoon.

The appalling history of Christian antisemitism means that we have much to learn from resources like this.

In the book, Baddiel's focus is the antisemitism of 'progressives'. In many ways, this is a group with which he aligns himself, and hence an

appropriate target. I'd have wanted to hear more about the interaction with the antisemitism of other groups, including those politically more conservative and of religious (specifically Christian) antisemitism. It was therefore appropriate that I then turned to Giles Fraser's book 'Chosen'.

Some will know of Fraser from his role as a Canon at St Paul's during the Occupy protests, others will have heard him as a regular contributor on Radio 4.

'Chosen' reflects the story of his breakdown following his resignation from St Paul's, and the way his subsequent journey toward recovery was deeply rooted in the rediscovery of his Jewish roots, particularly the experience of his great grandfather's brother who was a rabbi in Liverpool.

The name Fraser is itself an Anglicisation designed to help the family seem less conspicuous.


Unlike 'Jews Don't Count' this is a deeply theological book. It traces the way in which Christian Scriptures were written to represent different groups within Judaism, and come from a period before there was such a clear-cut distinction between Jews and Christians. It is only when we ignore that context that we find an apparent deep antisemitism in our Bibles.


Fraser speaks of a journey toward his personal healing, but through it we are reminded of the damage we can inadvertently still cause.

I'm very conscious of the fact that my own childhood experiences were significantly influenced by having parents who themselves grew up in wartime. I cannot begin to comprehend how much more profound is that effect when the life stories of Jews such as Baddiel and Fraser are wrapped up in flight from antisemitic pogroms which started long before the rise of the Nazis and the Holocaust.

I recommend both books. They are very different in style and subject matter, but the complement each other well.

75 not out!

A large congregation gathered at Trinity Methodist Church, Oadby, Leicester, to celebrate the Rev. Albert Mosley's 75 year as a Methodist Minister. He was ordained in 1952.

The President of the Conference, Rev. Graham Thompson and the Chair of the Northampton District Rev Canon Helen Cameron, were involved in the service, which was led by Trinity's Minister Rev. Derek McLean.

Early in the service, following an Indian tradition, the principle guests were honoured with a shawl, recognising their contribution to the Church. The presentation was made by Rev. Israel Selvanayagam, a Circuit Minister, who also brought greetings.

A series of greetings were then brought by a number of Albert's colleagues and associates including, John Lark (a colleague in Rhodesia), Rev. David Clarke (an Anglican Priest), Sally Ruane (a Roman Catholic), Resham Singh Sandhu (a Sikh and Chair of the Leicestershire Faith forum), Jeffrey Kauffman (Representing the Oadby Jewish Community) and Zuber Hassam (Principle of the Oadby Muslim School). Each spoke of Albert's remarkably effective inter-faith work in the years following his retirement in Oadby.

In his address Albert spoke of his calling to the mission field and his first appointment on Southern Rhodesia (later re-named Zimbabwe) and of his first appointment as Superintendent of the Wankie Circuit, which was as large as Yorkshire!

He re-counted his early years in a country he came to love and recalled movingly the challenges he faced in times of serious political unrest.

For 9 years he was the Methodist Overseas Division General Secretary, making a significant contribution to the world-wide outreach of the Church.

The theme of his address was "Bringing people together." His entire ministry reflected this inspired objective.

The President presented Albert with a long service certificate before preaching on the theme of "Sometimes Christians." He pointed out that Jesus wasn't a sometimes person: "You can't sometimes be a Christian and sometimes not." the President asserted. He linked his theme to Albert's fruitful and committed Ministry, reminding us that Albert was not a "sometimes" Christian.

During the service prayers of adoration, praise and confession were led by Helen Cameron and intercessory prayers by Howard Smith (a Circuit Local Preacher).

An appreciative congregation concluded the service with the hymn: "There's wideness in God's mercy." It had been a fitting thanksgiving for a life inspirationally lived.

But the last word is with Zabar Hassam: Speaking of Albert he said: "We have been fortunate to witness the light of the divine that he reflects in our community."

Many people know of my 'addiction' to the Cherry Scones.....and there are so many other 'goodies' available so whatever your taste is....there is something to satisfy!!

As you will know by now, the first Friday of each month is designated as 'Fish Fryday', when you can either 'take away a delicious meal to be eaten in your own home, pre-ordered and then collected between 5.00pm and 5.30pm or you can choose to 'eat in' from 6.00pm. The charge is £9.25 which does include bread & butter, but whichever option you choose, you do need to book....so go ahead and enjoy!

Michael also has some special themed evenings planned for June, July and August. On 16th June, there is an 'Italian' Night, followed by a 'Seventies' Night on 30th June. In July there is a 'Greek' Night on 21st of that month and then on 18th August there is a 'French' Night. However, as these evenings are extremely popular and numbers are limited to how many can be accommodated, so booking is essential – as I know to my experience having missed some because of my tardiness!! A holiday on the continent may not be for everyone, but you can certainly get a taste of the continent by coming to one or more of these special themed evenings!

News from Houghton Chapel

After all the excitement of the Coronation of King Charles III, (and the many Bank Holidays in May!) things have gone a bit quiet so it is probably the perfect time to reflect on all the good things that have happened in the Chapel in recent months.

As well as holding twice weekly services on Sundays and Wednesdays, we've had special services for Advent and Christmas and dressing our Lenten Cross to celebrate Christ's resurrection at Easter. We also had a celebration of the Church Anniversary in May preceded by the traditional tea. Looking at the plaque on the outside of the Chapel (carefully because some of it is worn away!) it is good to think of all those teas going back over time attended by those who have gone before us.

We have welcomed audiences to eight monthly 'Talks in the Chapel' which have been presented in partnership with Houghton Music Club. There were a range of talks and concerts to suit all kinds of interests which were well attended by Houghton village folks, as well as friends from Oadby, Great Glen and elsewhere. . The series began last September with an illustrated talk on 'Trials in Opera' by one of our congregation, Michael Lessiter, who is a former member of the Royal Opera Chorus. November saw Robert Calow arrive with a huge collection of clarinets of all shapes and sizes for a talk and demonstration called simply 'The Clarinet' and in December Richard Gill gave a talk about Dickens and Rosetti at Christmas to get us all in a seasonal frame of mind. Talks in the Spring included a thought provoking account of some aspects of his time in Israel-Palestine from Derek McLean which was well contrasted the following month with an entertaining talk, illustrated of course, by Neil Crutchley recalling TV and Radio themes of earlier days which had everyone humming along and wallowing in nostalgia!

We learned about the slightly bizarre history of Thurnby Court from local historian Derek Screaton. And a 'Concert of Music for a Spring evening' followed which was given by members of the Calow family and friends. The group treated us to an evening of sparkling short items on a variety of combinations of wind instruments and keyboard. The series concluded with a 'View from the Podium' by local conductor and composer David Fisher. We are already being asked 'what next?' and a new season is in the planning stage to start at the end of September.

Alongside all of this groups including the Houghton Singers have returned to use Chapel premises for their rehearsals. Most recently we have been delighted that our premises have been chosen to host a new foodbank in for the Trussell Trust in an area of Leicestershire where such facilities are less well established but nonetheless, sadly, very badly needed. They will operate from our schoolroom, I am sure the walls of the schoolroom would never have expected to witness such a sad turn of events and in a way we hope that their services will not be needed for too long.
